Also, please pray for Zinga this month as he meets with some inmates who have been doing the Romans Project in prison. Pray they would be encouraged to persevere and that God's word would change them.

Testimony from a graduate in Burkina Faso (translated from French)

At the onset of the project, I was a bit scared that I would find reading the book 20 times too challenging. But after reading it one, two, and three times, I began to find it more and more interesting and kept going. The transcribing of the whole text also seemed so daunting to me at first, since it had been so long since I had written a long text by hand. However, I soon saw that slowing down my study of Romans by writing out the text made me "see" what the verses actually mean. I came to really appreciate Romans 12.
